At our February 4th Pot Luck(following morning worship), we will not only celebrate Evalena Duncan for her 33 years of faithful service to Highland as our piano player, but we will also recognize the 214th anniversary of the founding of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church.

In the early 1800's as the American frontier expanded westward, there was a group of passionate Christian evangelists and pastors who deeply desired to spread the message of Jesus Christ to the people living in these remote and underserved areas. Many of these pastors served in the Presbyterian Church.

During those years, there arose a great religious revival bringing many to be saved. However, as these men went about their mission, they realized the traditional Presbyterian Church wasn't meeting the specific needs of the people. The pioneer settlers longed for a church that understood their unique struggles and need to share the gospel in a way that was accessible and relevant to their lives.

In 1810 under the leadership of the Reverend James McGready, this group of devoted believers gathered at the log-cabin home of Samuel McAdow in an area outside present-day Dickson, TN. There, they decided to break away from the established Presbyterian church. Not intending to start a new denomination, they were wishing to work with the established church to better meet the needs of the people. Being Presbyterian in government, with geographical areas called 'presbyteries, they named their new presbytery Cumberland Presbytery, after the area. Over the next few years, this presbytery grew to be what we now know as the Cumberland Presbyterian Church.

The Cumberland Presbyterian Church was characterized by a heartfelt commitment to evangelism, a fervent belief in the sovereignty of God, and an emphasis on the importance of a personal relationship with Jesus Christ. The church rapidly grew as their message resonated with the frontier settlers who were hungry for spiritual guidance and community.

Like the founders of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, you have a faith journey. Consider how you can respond to God's call with boldness and courage. Pray for God's continued blessings on the Cumberland Presbyterian Church as it spreads the Gospel and makes disciples.


Opportunities for Giving You may donate items throughout the year. The **Drop Box** is located in the Fellowship Hall - it's the red wagon.
